## DIRECTOR'S LETTER

In the summer of 2004, I embarked on my first short term mission trip to Uganda, to work alongside the local church and schools. This mission trip might have been short in length, but it brought about long-term benefits for me personally, and for many others who were part of that team. When I made the decision to go, I was primarily going to help and bless others and to understand more of the local culture, however, I was also blessed, beyond measure, by the local believers I met and by God's goodness to us throughout that time.



Going is not for everyone as many of us are called to stay and send. However, this magazine is all about encouraging each of you to consider afresh

if the Lord is calling you to go. As you do that, here are five points to think about:

#### 1. By going, you are obeying the Lord's

**command.** In Matthew 28 Jesus tells us to "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you". Europe has a population of 750 million and only 2.5% are evangelical Christians. Europe is a continent that needs to hear the Good News of Jesus, and we need people, like you, to go and share that news.

#### 2. By going, you are sharing God's desire for all nations to know Jesus as you meet

with people and share the love of Christ with them. 1 Chronicles 16:24 "Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous deeds among all peoples".

## **3.** By going, you will be a blessing to others. You will also be blessed. We go

because we want to help and share the love of Christ with people in a particular country and community, which reflects God's heart. By doing that, we are also blessed and loved by other believers, which builds up our faith and our relationship with Him. In John 13:34 Jesus tells us to "Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another".

## 4. By going, you will be able to pray and support missionaries better in the future.

Research shows that those who "go" are more likely to come back and be involved in praying for and giving to mission work in the future.

## 5. By going, you are joining with God to reach out to the continent of Europe.

Simon Marshall writes this: "God is at the centre of mission, and indeed the instigator of mission; it is his work before it is our work. It is based in God's love for the world and for his creation".

# WHY GO?

If you are reading this magazine, you may have never asked yourself the question, "Why do we need mission?" But this is a question which is raised on occasion, and we must be ready and willing to consider it; and to remind ourselves of why organisations such as ECM exist. There are lots of possible answers, but I want to just suggest one which, for me, is an overriding one - "There is only one God".

As John Stott put it, "monotheism lies at the heart of mission". It is:

- because there is only one God that we, as His people, are engaged in mission.
- because this God is both creator and redeemer, that we, as His people, are engaged in mission.
- because He alone is worthy of worship that we, as His people, are engaged in mission.

God created humanity to bring His rule to this earth (Gen 1:26-30); He chose and sent Abram so that he might be a blessing to all nations (Gen 12:1-3); Jesus sent His followers out to make other followers in all nations (Matt 28:17-20). All of this so the reality of who God is may be known by the whole earth.

We, today, stand in this river of history which has flowed from creation and will continue to flow until the new creation. In the new heavens and the new earth there will be no need for mission because then the worship around the throne will be from people of every nation, people and language (Rev 7:9).

Until that time, we have the privilege of joining with our God in reaching out to the continent of Europe; joining in the most exciting and rewarding commission ever given.

# GO WHERE?

ECM Ireland have members across Europe. Some have answered God's call to go and serve overseas, and some have been called to serve at home. Sebastian and Gloria Forjan have been called to serve at home in Slovenia and Aislinn Duffy has been called to serve overseas in Spain.

#### **Called to Go - At Home** By Sebastian and Gloria Forjan



Mission wasn't new to us when we got married, as Gloria grew up with missionary parents. However, they served in their own

country and to many church members, this was odd! Weren't missionaries supposed to leave their home to do missions? True, many did. Yet, Slovenia (2 million people) only had 1000 evangelical believers. This was a big enough reason to convince us to stay and serve at home – answering God's call to go, while remaining at home.

We already knew the language and the culture, and in 2003, began preparing for missionary life at Belfast Bible College. After our studies, we returned to Slovenia and prayerfully considered our next step. God brought us to Gorenjska, an Alpine region with high mountains. The estimated population is 206.621. We settled into the 4th largest city, Radovljica. Since we moved there, in 2007, God has been on the move. We began working with the youth, and the church was born. We pastor a church of 30 people, organize summer outreach activities, youth and children's camp and many more events to bring the gospel to our own people.



At university I studied International Business Management and Spanish, but even before then I'd always had an interest in all things Spanish- my parents used to joke that I was born in the wrong country! During my year abroad in Cádiz, I fell in love with the Spanish culture and people, and was impacted by the need for more Christian witness in the country. I felt like it made sense to go back to Spain once I had graduated, and as I was passionate about student ministry, it seemed to be the perfect fit working with students there.

One thing that I wasn't prepared for was the culture shock of living in Spain. I thought that since I had lived in Cádiz, it would be an easy adaptation. However, Barcelona is very different, as was the change from being a student to working with students. My first year was quite bumpy, with many mixed emotions, however knowing that people back at home were supporting me and were behind me in prayer, helped me through the first months of adjusting. I learnt what it meant to truly rest in God's grace and to be gracious to myself.

# GETTING STARTED ON GOING

It's important that you start by asking God what he has planned for your life. Then talk to a few trusted people who can help you reflect on your initial thoughts. As you take the first few steps below, see if God confirms them.

- Attend a mission conference, like Bangor Worldwide, which can help you discover more about mission work.
- As soon as you are seriously considering mission work somewhere in Europe, please contact us for an exploratory conversation. We will ask you to tell us something about your motivation and to send us your CV.
- If we agree together that there appear to be opportunities for you within ECM, you will become a candidate. This includes:
  - Completing questionnaires and asking others to complete references about you.
  - Conversations with ECM workers, the ECM board, your church leaders, and the team leader of your potential ECM

team. Usually, we recommend that you also visit the ECM team you're hoping to join.

- Possibly (additional) theological/ missiological education or more experience with work in your church.
- Building your support group in terms of prayer and finance. We will help and advise you, and your church and friends will play an important part. It isn't always easy, but we have seen that God provides with everything necessary when he calls you to serve him.
- Europe needs more people to share Jesus' love by planting and developing his church so that we can reach those yearning for meaning and purpose in their lives. Do you have a burden to see Europe transformed by the gospel?

# SHORT TER REFLECTIO



Having never experienced cross-cultural mission before, I was unsure of what to expect when heading to Athens. However, it was incredible to see throughout my time there how God is working through His people in the city's relatively small evangelical community.

My time was spent working primarily at the Petalouda Centre, which is an educational centre ran by Hellenic Ministries for the Roma community in Ano Liosia. It was great to witness relationships that have been built between the team at Petalouda and the Roma community, and to assist with the preschool program.

I was also involved in refugee ministries, which was a new experience for me. Meeting people from all over the world



made me realise that despite many cultural differences, all people have that same basic need for Christ. It was amazing to see how the believers in Athens understand that in their ministry among different people groups.

Throughout my time in Athens, I was greatly encouraged and feel much more equipped to support and pray for the believers there, and I couldn't recommend a short-term mission trip strongly enough!



As part of my university course, I was able to spend nine months serving in Roquetas de Mar on the south coast of Spain. Its port is often used as a way into Europe for people coming from North and West Africa, which means about a third of Roquetas' population is made up of immigrants. I served in a small church, Iglesia Evangélica de Vícar, where I was involved in various ministries that seek to share the gospel with people from a variety of different communities, many of whom from a Muslim background.

A typical week saw me helping at a drop-in centre which provides secondhand clothing, free coffee, and pastoral support for local Moroccan women. I taught English to Moroccan children and basic Spanish classes to both Moroccan and Nigerian women. At the weekend, I helped at a Christian kid's club, with a surprising majority of children attending from Muslim homes. I helped with my church's youth fellowship and played the piano in worship. During this past year, God has blessed me with a range of experiences as I served short-term. He has taught me about building relationships with people from all nations, especially Muslims, which has been new for me. He has been teaching me that even when it seems like progress is slow and time feels "wasted." He is always working, in ways that we don't often see. He is, undoubtedly. working out His purposes and doing a work much greater than we can ever imagine.



**Leah Houston** Short term in Ireland

As part of my theology degree at Belfast Bible College, I completed a four-week placement in Ferrybank. Waterford, alongside Colin and Ally Holmes. During my month's stay I was able to experience what living for Jesus looked like in a different culture. learn how to relate to people in an approach that is perhaps slightly different to what I am used to, and just overall experience church in such a loving, welcoming and open environment. ECM and all the lovely staff made it an extremely easy process, so for anyone thinking of serving on mission, I would highly recommend doing so with the ECM team. Not only are they incredibly helpful with all the admin. zoom calls and training, but they also value you as a person and what you bring as a follower of Christ, so much so, that you feel like you have gained a new family! My time in Waterford, Ireland was incredible, a true life changing experience, and has, alongside the help of the Holy Spirit, planted a seed in my heart for Ireland!

# THE MAN WHO WENT



#### Celebrating the life of Peter Crawford (7 September 1953 -19 August 2022)

Peter, our dearly loved friend, and colleague went to be with the Lord on the 19th of August 2022. A thanksgiving service to celebrate Peter's life was held on the 25th of August 2022 at his home church, First Coleraine Presbyterian. Several of Peter's friends and family members paid tribute to Peter, and what shone through was his clear vision, his deep love, and his unwavering commitment to the Lord.

Peter was born on 7th September 1953 to parents Gordon and Francis. Peter grew up in Coleraine with his brother John and sister Anne. After finishing school Peter went to Imperial College in London to study Math's and Civil Engineering. After he finished university, he went on a mission trip to Iran and that trip changed the trajectory of his life. After that trip, he went to the Bible Training Institute in Glasgow and that's where he met Anna and, shortly after their wedding in 1980, they became missionaries with SIM in Pakistan for around 18 years.

Peter held the role of Field Director for Pakistan for around 10 years, utilising that clear vision in supporting and leading missionaries, churches, and ministries across the breadth of the country. Whilst Peter and Anna were in Pakistan, God blessed them with three beautiful children Judith, Sharon, and Colin.

In 1999, Peter and Anna decided to come back to Northern Ireland and Peter got a job with European Christian Mission as Ireland Director, which he did for seven years, until he and Anna felt called by God to go and work with ECM in Portugal.

In Portugal, Peter and Anna were involved in church planting, discipleship ministries, providing hospitality, and member-care to many missionaries serving across Europe. As well as that, Peter was asked to take on the field leadership for Portugal as well



as wider roles within ECM internationally. Peter took on all these roles and ministries with great enthusiasm and vision.

After twelve years in Portugal, Peter and Anna then felt God leading and calling them to Greece to start and develop an ECM team and to provide pastoral care and support to Christian workers there. Under their leadership, the team in Greece continued to grow, thanks to their vision for the people there, and of course to the Lord for his leading and guidance.

It was not long after they arrived in Greece though, that Peter found out that he was unwell, and he and Anna would have to return to Northern Ireland whilst he underwent treatment.

The past year has been an incredibly challenging year for Peter, Anna, and the family as they have had to come to terms with leaving friends and loved ones in Greece, to set up home in Coleraine again. Despite that, Peter's clear vision, his deep love and unwavering



commitment to his calling did not diminish - he continued to minister to, pray for and lead the team in Greece and, he was continuing to learn Greek right up until the weeks before his death.

Even in the most difficult of times, Peter's clear vision saw God at work – his deep love for Anna, for his children, children in law, grandchildren and his wider family and friends was evident – as was his unwavering commitment to his calling and to the Lord.

In our sorrow we also celebrate - we celebrate the opportunity to have known Peter, to have worked alongside him and to have loved him. And, most of all, we celebrate the God that Peter loved and so faithfully served, celebrating the hope that only He can bring, even in the most difficult of days.

# OVERCOMING SPIRITUAL RAMPARTS

Outside Paris, rises Provins, a spectacular medieval city listed as a World Heritage Site by UNESCO. It is one the most visited towns in France and located in a rural area of 36,000 inhabitants called the Provinois. Unfortunately, the entire region has no established evangelical church. Several church groups have tried to plant a church in Provins but have failed due to strong resistance by local authorities and historical inhabitants. The city seems to be surrounded by spiritual ramparts difficult to conquer.

In Acts 18, the apostle Paul faced opposition as he preached the Gospel in Corinth, but the Lord encouraged him saying, 'Do not be afraid; keep on speaking, do not be silent. For I am with you... I have many people in this city' (Acts 18:9-10). Several Christians already live in Provins and long for a local Church. The Lord has certainly prepared many others! May the Gospel penetrate this city and change lives for His glory.

Philippe and Joanne have been serving the Lord in France for many years, first with Child Evangelism Fellowship and later with the French Baptist Union as Church Plant Coordinators, and latterly with Acts29 as Assessment Coordinators. They invested several years in launching the Baptist church of Donnemarie-Dontilly (south-east of Paris), and in 2021, Philippe passed on his role to a new pastor. Let us pray for them as they now take a huge step forward and start a new church plant in Provins. They need wisdom to find the best means of reaching this impressive historical city and the thirty-nine rural villages of the Provinois, and to lay solid foundations for a Gospel centred Church. We can pray for:

**1.** their church plant team.

**2.** monthly services that will be held in a village outside Provins from November.

**3.** the group of thirty adults and children already gathering around God's Word.

**4.** finding church premises in Provins itself in the coming months.
