Around 11,000 athletes and 4,000 para-athletes from over 200 nations brought their training, skills, passion and dedication to their various events. For two weeks, they caught the attention of an estimated 500,000 spectators and 1 billion viewers!

Incredible as I find these statistics, none have as big an impression on me as the fact that in Europe today there are only an estimated 2.5% evangelical Christians. Europe has significant mission needs, and I am grateful for the 250 ECM missionaries who are bringing their passion and dedication for the Gospel to over 100 ministries in 26 countries.

But this mission is not just theirs...it is also yours. We may not all be Olympians but as Christians, in the spirit of Hebrews 12:1-2, we can 'run with endurance' by our praying, encouraging and supporting of ECM mission workers. Also consider these questions:

WHY I SERVE IN EUROPE

My name is Rosaliene and I am the Disability Network Coordinator for ECM. Why would we have a Disability Network Coordinator? The World Health Organisation has recently updated figures on those living with disabilities in the world, which now stands at 16%. This means that 1 in 7 people in the world have a disability.

In many countries people with disabilities are excluded from hearing the Gospel either because their ill health prevents them from engaging socially with people or because of discrimination. This means that many of them never hear the Gospel.

There is a massive need for us as a mission agency to ensure we have the passion, compassion and understanding how to fully include everyone and ensure all the parts of the body of Christ have their place and that no one is left out.

We also have missionary families affected by physical or mental ill health. With my role, I seek to improve awareness of a range of health conditions including ADHD, autism, sensory impairments, mental health, etc. I can offer information about resources or organisations that can offer further help.

Within my role in the Member Care Leadership Team I can provide additional support for individuals who may be struggling with health-related issues and work towards greater sense of strengthening of their faith and well-being.

Working in the Balkans

Growing up, we were inspired by stories of missionaries in the 18th and 19th centuries, but we don't remember hearing of them coming to the western Balkans where we now serve. Our corner of Europe has been part of an 'East-meets-West' tug-of-war for a long time - part of Europe, but heavily influenced by the eastern powers that ruled for centuries.

We see the influence of those days in many areas, from daily life and food to religious affiliations and societal values. While seeking to hold on to cultural traditions, many people are drawn to a western dream that is marked by materialism and secular living. This is also a place where there has been very little visible, vibrant Gospel witness for centuries, a place where the Protestant Reformation of the 16th century didn't reach, and where Communism was king for much of 20th century. This was followed by a vicious war whose legacy lives on 25 years later.

Into this beautiful land, God has called us to bring a message of grace, forgiveness and hope to those whose lives were rocked by war, whose aspirations are often built on temporal things, and whose values are bound up in religious teachings from the middle east. He has called us to plant our lives here and live among a people who don't know Jesus. Our prayer is to see God's kingdom established in the hearts of individuals and families, bringing reconciliation and peace to their communities and glory to God through their lives.

'In Europe everything will be fine'. As we have worked with people seeking asylum, we have heard this phrase repeated over and over. For many people fleeing conflict, persecution and poverty, Europe - in their minds - is the place where every one of their problems will finally be solved. Europe is currently overwhelmed with people in search of this 'perfect life' falsely promised to them by family, friends and, more sinisterly, people smugglers attempting to get rich from people's suffering. In Micah 4:4, the prophet says:

Everyone will sit under their own vine and under their own fig tree, and no one will make them afraid, for the Lord Almighty has spoken.

We have the promise of this perfect life where peace, rest and security reign. This though is not to be found in Europe. It is found in Jesus, and Him alone. This is one of the reasons we love to serve in Europe. We get to meet people in search of everything that is promised in Jesus. Many have their eyes opened to the fact that Europe will not satisfy their longings, but Jesus will and will do so in ways that they could not have possibly imagined.



Bostjan and Lidija Cifer
Slovenia

Lidija and I both grew up in the Balkans, in predominantly Roman Catholic countries, where most people consider religion to be a private thing. In that context, we both experienced the transforming power of the Gospel and, out of gratitude, wanted to share the Gospel with other people. When you experience the beauty of the Gospel, you cannot keep silent!

Ten years ago, we moved to Maribor, the second largest city in Slovenia, where we took over the leadership of a newly founded church and started student work with IFES Slovenia. The Slovenian Evangelical community is very small (0,1%) and there is a severe shortage of national workers. In the past, we all expected that more missionaries would come to Slovenia and that mostly foreign missionary organizations would invest in spreading the Gospel in Slovenia. However, that way of thinking has changed. We realize that missionary work is not something that is done outside our borders or the responsibility of foreign missionaries, but the privilege and responsibility of us locals. Because of this shift, we saw an opportunity to start building a network with local leaders and churches where we think and pray together about how to raise a new generation of national Gospel workers who will be trained in their local context through the apprenticeship program.

If we want to see Europe transformed by the Gospel, we have to start where we are, in our local environment with our local people.

WHY I PRAY FOR EUROPE

It was in the summer of 1985 that I first joined an ECM team, working as a courier bringing practical support and encouragement to pastors in several countries of communist eastern Europe. Those were difficult days for people engaged in Gospel work behind the so-called 'Iron Curtain'; and we wondered how the day would ever come when things would change.

During the next couple of years, I recall attending a few half nights of prayer, organised by ECM in conjunction with other mission organisations, where we pleaded for the Lord's intervention on behalf of our brothers and sisters in eastern Europe. Then came the surprising and iconic events of 9th November 1989 with the fall of the Berlin Wall, and in the following months and years the complete collapse of communism across eastern Europe.

A new day of freedom had dawned for the church and for the proclamation of the Gospel. Many articles and books have been written suggesting the political reasons for that seismic turn of events, but for those of us who prayed earnestly for that new day of freedom there was but one clear explanation - the Lord had done great things, and we were filled with joy (Psalm 126:2-3). He had powerfully answered His people's prayers.

So, when I pray for Europe today this mighty work of God is always in my mind. Why should you join me in this great task? Here are some reasons:



The spiritual need is huge and the spiritual darkness great with an average of 2.5% evangelical Christians across the continent, but in many countries less than 1%.



There is a great work to be done by way of evangelism and church

planting, but we need to pray to the Lord of the harvest for many more workers to enter the field. (Matthew 9:38).



The great secular cities of 21st century Europe are little different from the pagan, cosmopolitan city that was 1st century Corinth, but we should still pray expectantly mindful of the promise the Lord gave to Paul for that place - "I have many people in this city." (Acts 18:10)



Some European countries that once colonised Africa & Asia now find themselves host to tens of thousands of migrants from those other continents - a big political and economic challenge, but also a new Gospel opportunity. For many migrants, hearing and believing the Gospel and confessing Christ as Lord is easier here in Europe than in their countries of origin.



Amidst a constantly changing scene both within Europe and globally, Europe remains influential on the world stage, and a season of powerful spiritual revival across Europe would undoubtedly have impact across the world.

As we pray for Europe and the millions of lost souls within its borders, may our cry to the Lord be that of the prophet Isaiah - "Oh that you would rend the heavens and come down... that the nations might tremble at your presence." (Isaiah 64:1-2)

WHY EUROPE NEEDS MISSION

Any attempt to grapple with this issue needs to start in the right place. It's tempting to begin by unleashing a set of statistics which lays bare the enormity of Europe's spiritual need. Without doubt, the facts and figures are genuinely disturbing and come as a form of shock-treatment to anyone who cares that people are perishing without a Saviour. So, don't misunderstand me, becoming familiar with the scale of the need and the extent of the challenge is vital, but first things first:

- 1 Europe needs missions because God loves Europeans.**
- 2 Christ died for Europeans.**
- 3 God is on the move to fulfil his eternal purpose by drawing Europeans to himself.**

This is what sets the context for missions in Europe.

With the Scriptures to guide us, we can identify two great truths that will draw us deeper into God's mission in Europe (or anywhere else!):

Truth No:1 - No people or place are beyond the scope of the Great Commission. Our marching orders are to go into all the world, to preach the gospel to

every creature, and to make disciples of all nations. Europe isn't excluded. Exemptions do not apply! Europe needs missions because it's included in our brief, which is binding on all who follow Jesus and who are indwelt by the Spirit of mission.

Truth No:2 - No people or place lies beyond the power of the gospel. God's eternal purpose, achieved through the agency of the gospel will have the final say. If you've read Revelation 7 then you've seen the trailer. Come that day every European country will be represented. Every European people group will be present. Don't believe the hype - Europe is not a "post-Christian" society! Well, ok, we know what they mean, but as far as Scripture is concerned there's only one post-Christian society and we call it Hell. Let's not swallow the lie that God is somehow finished with Europe.

It's fascinating to note how the Book of Acts ends. Paul is under house arrest in Rome and his fellow-Jews are proving resistant to the gospel. The Spirit of mission speaks into the situation: "...I want you to know that God's salvation has been sent to the Gentiles, and they will listen!" (Acts 28:28). That was both a description of what Paul had previously experienced, and it was a promise for the future. That promise remains in place and, unless I've missed something, Europe remains full of Gentiles!

I hope you see why we started where we did. Europe needs mission because of God's heart for Europe. We can add the following:

1. Missions in Europe is necessary

The statistics are shocking. Many argue that Europe is the most spiritually needy continent on earth. I have a special interest in the Balkans. It may just be the case that this cluster of countries forms the neediest part of the neediest continent on earth. Can I appeal to you, my fellow-Christian? Do your homework. Take time to visit the ECM website and expose yourself to the needs of Europe. Surely we have a spiritual duty of care to those who are our nearest neighbours.

2. Missions in Europe is doable

That's good news! The challenge of missions in Europe should not be underestimated. Perhaps it requires a bespoke form of endurance. It's certainly more of a life-passion than an occasional hobby, but Europe is open and accessible. Sure, it has its fair share of "ism's", but,



again, visit the ECM website and see the multitude of ways in which you can get involved in God's mission in Europe. There will be something you can do!

3. Missions in Europe is happening

God continues to raise up cross-cultural missionaries and send them into the European mission field. Praise God for the different missionary organisations that help make this happen as the way we do mission continues to evolve. One of the greatest joys in my Christian service has been the privilege of coming alongside national workers in various European countries and partnering with them in their work in the gospel. Here in ECM Ireland we have a proven track-record, and we want to continue to strengthen the work of mission by providing both national and cross-cultural workers with practical and spiritual support. This will only be possible through the committed support of individuals and churches in Ireland. What spiritual rewards lie in store for us on the other side of active engagement in mission!

Why Europe needs missions... Because of God's heart and Europe's need. I suppose the question that each of us needs to grapple with is what it means to stand between these two great realities as a follower of Jesus Christ? It would be our privilege to help you to think this through.

MISSION IN EUROPE CHANGES LIVES



Goran's Story

Europe needs mission because God loves Europeans. We should have a desire as believers to reach those near and far, even across our own continent, which doesn't always feel as glamorous or as far as other places across the world. The places we often associate with our summer holidays, or our winter city breaks, are desperately needy places.

Remember, Europe is the most unevangelised continent on Earth! Yet, there are countless stories across Europe that our ECM Ireland members can tell of how God has made Himself known and changed lives. God is working across Europe, and we want to see the peoples of Europe transformed in the name of Jesus Christ.

One such salvation story that tells of a life transformed and shows us why mission is needed in Europe, is our very own ECM Ireland member, Goran Macura who serves as a national worker in Slovenia alongside his wife in the town of Domzale. God has led and guided him, and worked powerfully in his life, with a clear distinction between his former life, and new life in Christ.

Goran grew up in a home that had many struggles, including alcoholism. Growing up, he felt abandoned and alone, that led

to him searching for love and hope in all the wrong places. In this search, he found friends who had similar upbringings, and their activities together resulted in Goran having to go to a juvenile prison, without finishing high school. There, at 17 years old, he was introduced to drugs and his addiction began becoming his lifeline. The path to quitting his addiction was difficult, including different religious practices like reiki, meditation and even a Muslim Imam. Goran remembers how he was full of hate and had no love for himself or anyone – only his need of drugs.

Eventually, Goran was thrown out of his home, which he recalls as being a blessing, as well as a challenge, as through this, his life was transformed by an encounter with Jesus. He went to Croatia for rehabilitation and there, he found love. The staff cared for him well, and because of his bad health due

to his addiction, he couldn't participate in all the physical activities, so he read. Staff at the centre gave him a copy of John's Gospel and he read it in one day. The staff encouraged him to re-read it and he read it 4 times in one week. During a time of physical labour, he found himself talking to God for the first time, accusing Him for things in his life and a clear voice said to Goran, 'truly I say to you, whoever commits a sin is a slave to sin'. Goran remembers realising that he was a sinner, but he didn't think he was a slave, and that was his first interaction with Jesus.

We know God speaks to us through His Word, and through it He works in miraculous ways. That wasn't Goran's last encounter with Jesus, as the plans He had for Goran were just beginning. Goran remembers how he wanted to return to Slovenia, but 3 things stood in his way after being in rehab for 17 months: his mother didn't want him home, he enjoyed the love at the centre and he was full of pride. One day, there was a quiz on the Gospels and because Goran didn't know anything, he was determined not to fail. Out of this pride, God reached him, as he started to read the gospels! Contemplating his future

beyond rehab, he knew he would probably return to his drug-filled life when going home, and that's when he realised he was a slave to his sin. He decided to stay in rehab, with the Christians that seemed slightly strange, and although he had only read the Gospels, God spoke to him through Jeremiah 29:13 'if you seek me with your whole heart you will find me'. On the day he was due to leave, he was born again – he confessed his sins and knew he didn't want to live without God anymore. He stayed in the centre 3.5 years and his life was transformed. He oversaw newcomers to the centre and shared his faith with everyone, even when he wasn't supposed to!

When he returned to Slovenia after being away for 5 years, he had a strong desire to share his faith with his own people, knowing that they too needed freedom only found in Jesus. Goran praises God for those who invested in him as he started his journey and counts it as a privilege to now serve God in ministry. We, at ECM are grateful the Lord has placed his home country on his heart to serve in. The people of Europe need people like Goran to tell them the Good News of Jesus Christ. Could God be calling you?



WHY EUROPE?

When you think of revival today, do you think of Europe? We know that God is doing amazing things in Africa, Asia and Latin America, but why don't we hear about that in Europe?

Europe is often spoken of as "the Secular Continent". Mission mobilisation to Europe is predicated on the tiny percentage of Evangelical Christians. Conferences often include the unchallenged affirmation that Europe is post-Christian and needing re-evangelisation. Yet have we ever stopped to consider if these presuppositions are actually true?

Sadly, many Christians both in Europe and in other parts of the world seem to have internalised the myth of the inevitable decline of European Christianity. Rather than holding to our eschatological hope demonstrated in the resurrection of Jesus Christ, when it comes to Europe, we have internalised an eschatology of despair.

Yet, out of the spotlight, an extraordinary re-evangelisation of Europe is underway.

I think we can identify three primary dimensions of that re-evangelisation and you can read much more about this in my Europe 2021 report.

1. Church planting movements

In almost every European country, there is an acceleration in the number of new churches being planted. Whether that is the result of denominational initiatives, through mission agencies, individuals, new Christian communities are sprouting up almost everywhere you look.

Just one example: The vision of the CNEF (National Council of French Evangelicals) "1 pour 10,000", meaning one evangelical church for every 10,000 people, has spurred on church planting in France and has seen, on average, one church planted every seven days or so over the last ten years.

2. Diaspora churches

We are living in the age of World Christianity. The centre of gravity of the world church has shifted from Europe to the Majority World. Yet over the last fifty, millions of Majority World Christians have come to Europe and this has changed the face of European Christianity.

Latin-American migrants have planted churches in Spain, Portugal and beyond. African-initiated Pentecostal churches number in the thousands in Britain alone. There are more Chinese Evangelical Churches in Italy (31) than the total number of Evangelical Churches in the neighbouring country of Slovenia.

3. Next Generation

Amazing things are happening amongst Europe's youth and again. What will Europe look like in 2050, when those who are born today are in their early adulthood? Well, the demographics of Europe's tomorrow are already certain, because birthrates across Europe over the last twenty-five years have collapsed. Some Mediterranean countries now have rates that are among the lowest in the world:

Low birthrates are combined with a second demographic reality: a substantially larger older generation. Europe's Old Age Dependency Ratio, the number of people aged 65+ per 100 people of working age, is expected to rise from around 30 in 2015 to between 50 and 60, and in the case of Italy and Spain, to between 70 and 80, by 2050 (Source: Eurostat 2021). In other words, for every five working people in Spain in 2050 there will be four pensioners.

Last week, I sat down in church next to an elderly man I hadn't seen before. Tony is a widower. His wife died just 18 months ago. He told his children he didn't want to be a burden and he was very happy to go to an old people's home. Tony used to be a Baptist minister, and now in the old people's home, he has a queue of people waiting to visit him. The door to his room is always open and spiritually needy old people are seeking him out. "I have never had such a fruitful time in my ministry as I do now", he said. Tony is 85 years old.


In tomorrow's Europe there will be more needy old people than in all its history. Lonely people, people who have lost hope, people living with fear, people who need to hear the gospel of Jesus Christ. What an opportunity God has set before us!

God has not given up on Europe. It may be out of the spotlight but church planting is accelerating, diaspora churches are everywhere, and in the next generation, young and old will have unprecedented gospel opportunity. And we know how the story ends: with every nation represented before the throne (Revelation 7:9).

Why Europe? Because God is working in Europe. So let's change the story we are telling about mission in Europe. Let's stop talking about Europe being post-Christian. Europe is not post-Christian. It is pre-revival.

Translation Project:

HOW TO TALK ABOUT JESUS (WITHOUT BEING THAT GUY)

Have you ever put your foot in it when sharing about Jesus? Or at least it has felt like you did? “How to talk about Jesus (without being THAT guy)”: personal evangelism in a sceptical world, by Sam Chan is a relevant book for you, and I would like to get it into the hands of my students in their heart language, in Spanish.

I work with university students in Spain, encouraging them to talk about Jesus on campus. As I read this book, I thought how good it would be for the students that I work with to be able to read it, hence this project to get it translated into Spanish!

This project aims to raise the necessary funds to cover the translation, publication and distribution of this book. Although there are many books already on this topic, it is one of the best books I have read on the subject and would love the students to also be encouraged and challenged by it. (I encourage you to get reading it too!)

I hope that by reading about new and simple, yet profound, ways of engaging with those who don't yet know Christ, the GBU students would be encouraged to step out and share the gospel with those around them. This book outlines simple and relevant ideas for the 21st century of how to engage, which hopefully will further inspire the students to share life, and thus their faith, with those who don't yet know Christ.

We need 4,000 to cover the translation and printing costs. Would you consider partnering with us to raise this?

The translation project will be through Andamio Editorial (**andamioeditorial.com**), the publishing house that forms part of GBUnidos Spain, Grupos Biblicos Unidos (United Bible Groups).

The aim of Andamio Editorial is to provide Christian literature to build up the Evangelical church in Spain. The name “Andamio” means “scaffolding” in Spanish, with their aim being to provide literature that supports, builds up and equips. From the contents of the books being faithful to God's Word to the presentation and design of them, it all seeks to be true, authentic and beautiful.

One of the categories within Andamio Editorial is “GBU Conecta” which contains books for university students, books that they can give to seekers about the Christian faith, others on personal evangelism and how to share with their friends, as well as books on apologetics and defending the faith. This is part where I work, with university students, thus wanting to get this book translated and into the hands of students across Spain.
